# Jaakko Mäntyjärvi (1963-) Announcements

We begin with four Announcements, courtesy of Finnish composer Jaakko Mäntyjärvi. Please give these your full attention, even if you have attended many concerts before.

# Sarah Hopkins (1958-) Past Life Melodies

In Past Life Melodies Australia's Sarah Hopkins seeks to evoke the timeless sounds of the Australian outback, celebrate the diversity of humankind - and push singers around at their technical limits. As well as sustaining an interminable pedal note they are gradually divided into eleven parts and then required to draw on the techniques of throat singing to manipulate vowels to create harmonics. These are the whistly sounds prominent in the last section.

# Reuben Rameka (1997-) Waitā

Reuben Rameka's Waitā was written as a commission for the New Zealand Choral Federation's Matariki He Reo concert at the 2024 World Choir Games. Waitā is one of the cluster of stars that together create the Matariki cluster. He is associated with the ocean and the foods gathered from it, and responsible for ocean tides and floodwaters. The piece reminds us of the conservation and environmental responsibilities that we owe to the ocean in return.

# André J. Thoma (1952-) Rockin' Jerusalem

In Rockin' Jerusalem André Thomas draws on the African American <u>spiritual</u> tradition, in which a common theme is trust in the freedom and salvation that will eventually be found in heaven. <u>Some spirituals</u> are sombre and sorrowful, but others are more upbeat, complex and syncopated - like this one.

# Ludwig van Beethoven (1770-1872) Egmont Overture

Ludwig van Beethoven was a political animal and in his Egmont Overture he honours the heroic sacrifice of a man condemned to death for having taken a valiant stand against oppression. This was ostensibly Lamoral, Count of Egmont who was executed in 1568, in what was then the Spanish Netherlands, by the Spanish inquisition. He probably did not expect that, but the dignity with which he met his fate inspired a national uprising which eventually led to the Netherlands gaining its independence. What Beethoven was actually writing about in 1809 was the tyranny of the selfappointed Emperor Napoleon Bonaparte, but the work has a universal, timeless resonance. It was used as the unofficial anthem for the Hungarian Revolution of 1956.

# Anthony Ritchie (1960-) Concerto for Viola No.1

<u>Anthony Ritchie</u> is a son of Canterbury but has mostly been based in Otago, including serving as composer-inresidence for the Dunedin Symphony Orchestra in the 1990s, when he met a violist who would subsequently become his wife. Among orchestral players it is fashionable, to the point of compulsory, to despise the viola, but Ritchie knows what's good for him and calls it one of his favourite instruments. with a "mellow but rich tone and plaintive high register. It can be so expressive and somewhat melancholy but also capable of dynamic, lively ideas". These qualities are explored in his Viola Concerto of 1994. There are four movements, of which the last three are linked together. Near the end there are hints of Gershwin and bluegrass music.

# Franz Peter Schubert (1797-1828) Symphony No. 8, 1st movement

It is not known exactly why Franz Schubert did not finish what would have been his eighth symphony, although it is speculated that he might have been put off by a bout of syphilis. In any case, if not quite on a par with the early death of Mozart, his Unfinished Symphony of 1822 is one of music's great regrettables, and there have been many attempts since then to create a completed version. A competition to that end attracted over 100 entries in 1928, and more recently Huawei got AI to produce something, although it seems the results were rubbish. This first movement is all Schubert's own work and in it he packages memorable tunes, creative

orchestration and harmonic handbrake turns into something like the classical sonata form - Two contrasting themes are introduced, messed around with and finally restated as their best selves. If nothing else, you will probably recognise the second theme, where the cello tune goes "This is – the symphonee – that Schubert wrote but never fin-ished".

# Jake Runestad (1986-) Earth Symphony

In their Earth Symphony, regular collaborators US choral rockstar composer Jake Runestad and criticallyacclaimed poet Todd Boss take on the largest of themes. Our planet, personified as Mother Earth, tells of her brief (in geological terms) encounter with humankind, whom she calls Mirabilia – marvels, miracles). There are five movements whose text is set out below, explaining the narrative. In the second movement the music makes reference to the Seikilos Epitaph, the world's oldest musical composition, as the story of the fall of Icarus is dramatized, while the fourth movement is a modern take of Dido's Lament from Henry Purcell's opera Dido and Aeneas.

# Earth Symphony: Text

# I. Evolution

Forever alone – four billion years of empty space and dormant stone.

Then you were born:

Humankind!

and soon upon your face there dawned a trace of mind!

You scorned the odds to be reborn as gods of reason, authors of wonder, inventors of alchemy, chemistry, astronomy. You alone unwound the helix of my chi. You mirrored me to me.

Mirabilia!

You were my light.

Never shall I dare to dream another dream so bright.

# **II.** Ambition

And how are you fallen so soon?

Do you remember Icarus, whose father gave him wings of wax and feathers for a toy?

There he is – in memory's eye – canary of a boy!

[Icarus:] O, joy – so much at hand! – to soar the strand, over sea and shore! Whee! – to taste ambition pure!
Two wingbeats more,
and I can see the patterns
on the ocean floor.

O. me

I'm free as albatross! Stronger than ever with a father so clever with beeswax and feather! I flap them together and higher and higher I rise! –

I am a dream!
I'll touch the moon!

How small she is – the bluegreen planet far below... I belong to her no longer. Who am I, without her?

The sun.
The sun grows.
The sun grows ever hotter...

[Earth:] Yes I remember Icarus, who flew too near the sun. Waxen wings undone, he tumbled, thrashing, and came crashing into the sea!

So fell humanity.

So fell I.

# **III. Destruction**

Terrore atmospherae!
You make your mother torturer!
Twist me against my nature,
waste me to tinder,
roast me under the
torches of the sun
Till I'm undone.

You dam my waters,

bleach my corals, flood me strangle me, slaughter each other, set me

on fire!

I am rage! I am war! Where are your gods now?

Mirabilia!

What have you done, over-blessed one? briefest of species, what have you done?

# IV. Lament

Sleep now, my children, now your days are done.

Nevermore shall you adore the setting of the sun.

Sleep now, forever, lofted in time. No seraphim to rouse thee, no carillons to chime.

Mirabilia!

Never shall I dare to dream a dream so bright.

Sleep now, my children, my wonder, my light.

Never shall I dare to dream another dream so bright.

Mirabilia!

Never shall I dare to dream a dream so bright.

Sleep now, my children, though the cradle fall.

You rest among the yesterdays, the softest place of all.

Mirabilia!

# V. Recovery

Alone, forever, the mirror dims.

space.

Dormant

stone.

No, I shall not go alone. Ivy shall recover every avenue, seaweed swallow every drain, and forestry sow a sorcery over every human stain.

Solace Ward Viola 2025 WYO Concerto Competition Winner



Solace Ward is a student in their first year of a Bachelor of Music at the NZSM, studying viola with Gillian Ansell and majoring in performance and composition. Solace began their musical education playing violin with Marise McNeill, and later Elizabeth Patchett.

In 2023, Solace was named Dux Artium of Palmerston North Girls High School and attained their LTCL diploma in viola, having previously achieved ATCL in violin. Solace has been a member of the National Youth Orchestra for several years, serving as associate principal of the viola section in 2025. They are currently principal viola of the Wellington Youth Orchestra and have previously held the same role with both the New Zealand Secondary Schools' Symphony Orchestra and the Manawatu Youth Orchestra.

Solace enjoys exploring a wide range of musical styles, including chamber music. This year, they received the Donald Armstrong Award at the NZSQ Adam Summer School. In the past they have also competed at the National Young Performers' Awards, and won Manawatu competitions on both viola and violin. As the inaugural recipient of a Young Composers' Scholarship in Manawatu, Solace was commissioned to compose a piano quintet premiered earlier this year.

Mark Carter was born in Poole, Dorset in the UK. He studied trumpet at The Royal Academy of Music in London and the Queensland Conservatorium.

For over 25 years he has held the position of sub-principal trumpet with the New Zealand Symphony Orchestra. He has also worked with the Cape Town Opera and Ballet Orchestra, Queensland Philharmonic, Queensland Symphony, Adelaide Symphony and Singapore Symphony Orchestra. Whilst studying trumpet at the Royal Academy of music in London he also studied conducting, taking part in conducting master classes with Sir Colin Davis and Sir Simon Rattle.

Since moving to NZ, Mark has conducted several community orchestras around the country, Wellington Youth Orchestra and Stroma contemporary music ensemble.

Christiaan van der Zee is a professional violist, music educator and maths teacher. Trained in South Africa, Wellington, Germany and USA, he was also a founding member of the Tasman String Quartet. The Tasmans were participants, finalists and prize winners in several international competitions in the USA, Germany and Australia, and also toured for Chamber Music New Zealand.

Alongside his work as a maths teacher and Music Director of WYS, Christiaan is Principal Viola in Orchestra Wellington and plays regularly with the NZSO. He is an active chamber musician and runs the Karori Classics chamber music for charity series in Wellington together with a group of wonderful volunteers.

Christiaan loves working with young people in a music setting and since 2012 he has been specialising in the training of youth ensembles and youth orchestras.

Rowan Johnston is HOD Music and Director of the recently launched Chilton Music Academy at Chilton Saint James School in Lower Hutt. He holds a Post-Graduate Diploma and Masters degree (1st Class) in conducting from the University of Auckland where he studied under Dr Karen Grylls CNZM.

Before taking up the directorship of the Wellington Youth Choir in 2023, Rowan conducted the internationallyacclaimed choir Choralation from Westlake Girls and Boys High Schools, the Auckland Youth Choir and was Director of Choirs at Auckland Cathedral of the Holy Trinity.

For the last three years, Rowan has co-conducted the Aotearoa Academy Choir and was recently appointed as Music Director of the New Zealand Youth Choir. He is a regular guest conductor at the Australian National Choral School and in demand nationally and internationally as an adjudicator, conductor and choral clinician. Rowan is a National Choral Advisor for the New Zealand Choral Federation and, as a singer, is a member of the Voices New Zealand Chamber Choir.
